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

New C&S Structures will see greater student involvement in decision-making

At a recent Clubs and Societies Committee meeting it was agreed to implement new Clubs and Societies structures, that will compliment what is already in place as well as increase student involvement in the decision making for Maynooth University Clubs and Societies.

In short, a Societies Management Committee and a Clubs Management Committee have been established to encourage, promote and develop clubs and societies life on campus. These Management Committees will be made up of a number of Maynooth University staff and students. In order to get these committees up and running for September we will be holding elections before the end of June via MU Life.

There were a number of information sessions held on the 9th June to outline these changes and what steps the C&S Office will be taking next in order to progress this issue.

MAYNOOTH UNIVERSITY GAA PARTNER WITH THE GPA TO OFFER POSTGRADUATE SCHOLARSHIPS



The Gaelic Players Association (GPA) are delighted to announce details of a new scholarship agreement with Maynooth University. Under the agreement, four fully-funded scholarships will be available to inter-county players annually, with successful applicants to be known as 'Maynooth University/GPA Scholars'.

The agreement between the GPA and Maynooth will run for an initial three-year period starting with the 2021/2022 academic year and scholarships will be available for any fulltime Masters/Postgraduate courses available in University. All applications will be assessed using a set of criteria agreed by the GPA and the University. In combination with their studies, scholars will actively contribute to the Maynooth GAA community and mentor other elite sports students at undergraduate level.

This new agreement strengthens the long-term existing relationship between the GPA and Maynooth University. Numerous graduates of the Jim Madden GPA Leadership Programme have gone on to complete the Special Purposes Certificate in Professional Leadership at the University over the last four years.


MUSICAL SOCIETY

FREE LEGAL ADVICE CLINIC (FLAC)

Maynooth University Free Legal Advice Centre (MU FLAC) is a very active and vibrant law society. We welcome members from all year groups. Our aim is to promote equal access to justice for all. We hold free legal advice clinics where students can come to (via Zoom and hopefully in person soon!) to explain their legal issue to a barrister and receive a free consultation.

We also train our members in areas of law such as Criminal Law, Landlord & Tenant Law, Employment Law, and many other areas to allow them to assist at our legal clinics and provide legal information to clients. MU FLAC enables you to take what you learn in the classroom and use it to help others in real legal issues – good practice if you wish to pursue a career as a solicitor or barrister! We also hold guest lectures from lecturers and practitioners in their areas of expertise, and social events such as quizzes, moot court competitions, and advice on studying law at third level.

In April 2021 we published "A Guide to Student Rights" which is a legal hand booklet written by MU FLAC members aimed at providing students with easy to understand legal information. This book is freely accessible in pdf format on our website or in hardcopy in the MU Library.

Even though we were off-campus last year, we created a community with like-minded people, hosted lots of events, and made our members feel part of campus life despite studying from their bedrooms.

FREE LEGAL ADVICE CLINIC (FLAC)

LAUNCH OF "A GUIDE TO STUDENT RIGHTS"

Maynooth Free Legal Advice Centre (FLAC) Society officially launched 'A Guide to Student Rights', on 17th April 2021. This guide contains rights and regulations ranging across a number of different areas including Criminal Law, Rights on a Night Out, Landlord & Tenant Law, Employment Law, Taxes & Finances, Travel Abroad, Useful Contacts, and a Covid-19 Section. Additionally, it was composed with the interests of the students at Maynooth University in mind, attempting to invoke awareness and education within the broader campus community. Thus meaning, it provides the information in a user friendly and easy to read manner.

The concept of this guide was brought to light by Former President, Scott Connolly, Former Vice President, Matt Jones and Former Secretary, Niall Finan and it was co-authored by former Editorial Officers, Rachel O'Rourke and Hugh Logue and current Editorial Officers, Ewa Smolaga and Hira Khan. The guide underwent composing and editing for two years, due to the continually evolving nature of COVID-19 legislation. As a result, even though it is not the only guide of its kind to have been published, it is the largest. It covers the most up to date regulations in a comprehensive and concise manner and keeping in line with the core ethos of FLAC which represents access to justice for all, the guide has been published on MU FLAC society's newly established website (https://muflac.webador.ie/).

Furthermore, 'A Guide to Student Rights' could not have been published without the proud sponsorship and support of Maynooth Law Department, the Clubs and Societies Office and Conor Duff BL. To mark this momentous occasion, MU FLAC society held a virtual zoom launch with FLAC CE Eilis Barry and Conal Cahill, representatives of FLAC Ireland, providing an insight into FLAC Ireland. Additionally, speeches from Professor Michael Doherty, Head of the Law Department at Maynooth University and finally, former and current committee members were also presented at the launch.

Johanna Airey Moot Court Competition 2021 – MU FLAC inaugural Moot

On Saturday 10 April 2021, Maynooth University FLAC held their inaugural moot court competition The Johanna Airey Moot. The question was very much in line with MU FLAC ethos and focused on human rights issues. The question centred around compulsory vaccination and legislated lockdowns, very topical issues which have seen the European Court of Human Rights issue judgement on compulsory vaccination only days before the moot. This engaging question was kindly written by Maynooth University alumni Conor Duff BL.

Teams from Maynooth University, Trinity College Dublin, Dublin City University, and Griffith College all competed on the day. Judges consisted of Maynooth University lecturers, lecturers from other Irish Universities, Barristers, and PhD Students. Each moot had its own timekeeper which were made up of members of MU FLAC.

The Final was judged by the retired Supreme Court Judge and President of the Law Reform Commission, Ms. Justice Mary Laffoy, alongside Rosario Boyle SC, and Conor Duff BL.

Amazingly no technology issues arose and all in all a great day was had! The standards of the teams were very high and proved for difficult judging. Adam O'Carroll, student at Maynooth University won Best Speaker. Anna Offergeld and Daniel Walsh of Trinity College, and Darragh Gorman and Jesutofunmi Omokri of Maynooth University reached the Final with Darragh and Jesutofunmi succeeding to become the winners of The Johanna Airey Moot Court Competition 2021.

This event was kindly sponsored by the Department of Law at Maynooth University and City Colleges.

The Johanna Airey Moot Court Competition 2021 will go down in history for MU FLAC as not only the first ever mooting competition hosted by the society but also for taking place in strange online conditions.
